All 139 fourth-year medical students matched! Of those, six were in a secondary match and 14 matched earlier through the San Francisco, urology, or mili-



tary match programs. Primary residency locations spanned 30 states (an increase from last year): 54% in the Midwest (37% in Illinois), 17% in the West, 17% in the East, and 11% in the South. Loyola is the residency site for 17% of our 2011 graduates.

Twenty-seven specialties are represented, including 33% in primary care residencies (family medicine, internal medicine, pediatrics, and medicine/pediatrics). Another third of the class

matched in anesthesiology (8%), obstetrics/gynecology (7%), emergency medicine (6%), general surgery (6%), and orthopaedic surgery (6%).

Selecting a residency program that is a good match for the student is always a complicated process and a very personal one. As we reviewed the programs that accepted our students, 38% were within the top one-third of training programs across the country and the remainder in the mid-third.

Congratulations to our students and their families for a job well done! I also extend my personal thanks to the faculty and staff who were directly involved in our students' success.







EMERGENCY MEDICINE - A NEW CLERKSHIP

Stritch School of Medicine added its first new clerkship in fifteen years. The required, 4-week Emergency Medicine clerkship takes place in the fourth year and will allow students to independently assess undifferentiated patients in the Emergency Department and present directly to emergency medical services faculty. Using real-time formative faculty feedback, students will be instructed in refinement of history and physical examination skills, and their abilities to develop and justify appropriate diagnostic and management plans. They also will have the opportunity to become more

adept at rapid decision-making, stabilization of patients, documenting, multi-tasking, and interpreting diagnostic tests. The ED will provide a safe, supervised environment for students to improve skills relating to all six Stritch core competencies. Each rotation includes four, dedicated

educational days that permits case-based discussions, high fidelity patient simulation, procedural task training, and point-of-care ultrasound use for diagnostics and procedures. Dr. Trent Reed is the Course Director and Drs. Joseph Mueller and George Lew are the Assistant Directors. This clerkship is supported through the surgery department's Division of Emergency Medical Services and their chief, Dr. Mark Cichon.

CSGH & ISI



The 2011 Auction was a great success, raising support for over 60 students, and 25 faculty and staff to participate in International Service Immersion (ISI) trips. This year's trip leaders include medical school, nursing school, and university faculty. ISI trips depend on their in-country partners, who guide and lead the students and leaders as to the needs of the community and the best way to serve. We are delighted that we have worked with all of this year's sites in prior years, some representing 18 year long relationships with the ISI program. Examples of in-country organizations are the Working Boys Center in Quito, Ecuador, and San Lucas Mission, Guatemala.

This year there are 30 Global Health Fund recipients ranging from first-year through fourth-year medical students. These trips are independent, student-led initiatives that were carefully selected based on prior global health commitments and relationship to the country and communities served.

The Center for Service and Global Health continues to develop curricular support and recognition for select students who are committed to global health as part of their professional life. A Global Health Scholars program that would include a Certificate of Public Health from a School of Public Health is one of those programmatic pieces currently being developed.

DROWNING IN DEBT: INNOVATE OR ELSE (Condensed from an article from THE AAMC Reporter by Catherine Spina, MD, PhD Candidate, Year Five, Boston University School of Medicine)

The day their first medical school acceptance letter arrives in the mail aspiring doctors experience an overwhelming sense of relief and elation. At last, they have been invited to join the medical profession. Inevitably, however, students are forced to consider the cost of attending medical school. On a recent visit to Capital Hill, I, along with other members of the AAMC's Organization of Student Representatives Administrative Board, met with staff from the offices of our senators and interns were also worried about their educational debt. How could we possibly complain?

First, as the cost of medical education continues to rise, we are fortifying barriers that prevent less-fortunate and underrepresented students from pursing medicine. **Second**, many students will succumb to the pressures of their financial stress. **Third** is the phenomenon known as "brain drain." Why should a recent graduate invest an enormous amount of money and time in order to become a physician when they could complete their MBA and enter the lucrative field of business in, relatively speaking, no time at all?

The hard truth is nothing is free. As we pursue effective and cost-effective solutions for our health care system in the broad sense, I challenge medical schools, teaching hospitals, and medical students to take an equally critical look at creating efficient, cost-effective solutions for medical education.
